# City eyes property at Main and 75

Luverne City Council members met in closed session Tuesday, May 18, to consider purchasing property at 102 S. Kniss in Luverne.

The property on the southwest corner of Main Street and Highway 75 is owned by members of the Dennis and Norma Remme family.

It was the location of Remedez Hair Salon, started in 2007, and the business office for Remme Construction.

It closed in January and the 7.348-square-foot lot was listed for sale in March for \$162,500.

At last week's meeting, the council authorized City Administrator John Call to make an offer on the corner lot.

As of Tuesday's press deadline, a purchase agreement hadn't been signed.

The Remedez lot borders a property to the south at 108 S. Kniss that the city bought from the VanderPoel family for \$39,900 on Oct. 15, 2019.

The Remedez lot borders a lot to the west that the city purchased in 2015 from Dale and Karen Bosch, Beaver Creek, for \$70,000.

The house between Remedez and the municipal liquor store on the lot was demolished and the property has been held for future development.

The intent for the Remedez lot, if the city buys it, would be to lease it to an interested business.

At their May 10 meeting, board members accepted the resignations of two teachers -Jeanette Vanden Hoek, 25 years at the secondary school in science, and Diane Vanden Hoek, 31 years

Current sixth-grade teacher Renee Edmundson was approved to transfer to the elementary school to fill Diane Vanden Hoek's position.

## Additional wells to be sampled for groundwater atlas

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources has so far collected water samples from 57 wells in Rock County for use in the county's groundwater atlas.

An additional 33 samples are still needed to complete the groundwater sampling plan, with sampling proposed in May and June of 2021.

Property owners will be contacted by mail or phone for permission to sample their wells. The process involves collecting a water sample from an outside location for laboratory analysis.

Participation is voluntary and property owners will receive a report of the laboratory results.

Wells are selected based on geology, location, well depth and well construction.

Data from participants' wells will help the DNR create county maps and descriptions of groundwater distribution, movement, and conditions, and the pollution sensitivity of aquifers.

The final products will be available as printed maps, reports and geographic information system (GIS) files available on the web.

The atlas can be used to help identify viable water sources, evaluate supply, identify recharge sources and flow, manage sustainability, guide decisions for well and septic system construction, assist Property owners will be contacted by mail or phone for permission to sample their wells.

in well-head protection for public water supply, and assess pollution sensitivity and likely contamination migration.

County atlases are produced in two parts over the course of several years.

Part A covers the geology of the county and is expected to be completed for Rock County in 2021 by the Minnesota Geological Survey.

Part B will expand on this information to cover the hydrogeology (groundwater) using the new Rock County well sampling data. The DNR expects to complete Part B in 2022.

The county atlas program is funded in part by the Minnesota Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund as recommended by the Legislative-Citizen Commission on Minnesota Resources.

Funding also comes from the Clean Water Fund, which receives 33 percent of the sales tax revenue from the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment approved by voters in November 2008.

"At first we dismissed it," Bob said. "And then we took a drive down the day after Thanksgiving. The town felt nice. It was clean and inviting."

Annette said it felt like Luverne could be home.

So, they expressed interest and were invited to interview and meet the congregation.

"It was a meet and greet with the search committee, and it was like we already knew all of them," Bob said. "We left here that afternoon and we felt great. It was comfortable."

Bob's first sermon on March 14 was based on Nehemiah, who organized the rebuilding of the wall of Jerusalem.

"I talked about being 'all in.' Our ministry is to change and refresh,"

tion. "Sometimes people have the wrong ideas about what Assembly of God means," she said.

The Junaks work part time as pastors and part time as commercial millwork estimators for a company in Blaine. Between pastoring and estimating, they both work full time.

"It's like working two full-time jobs," Bob said.

Annette is also a credentialed pastor and delivered the Mother's Day message. Their son, who is also

Nora Wysong effective at the end of 2020-21 school year. Band instructor Steve Olson's resignation was also accepted.

### Backyard asparagus patch may ruin the sport of hunting and foraging

Hunting season is upon us, and I don't mean pheasants or deer. I'm talking about



asparagus — spotting it in its natural environment, camouflaged in roadside ditches and grassy field driveways.

Asparagus hunting involves special wild game hunting instincts not utilized with big game or birds.

It requires an eagle eye and heightened peripheral vision in order to spot a single green stalk among tall green grass at 50 mph down a gravel road.

My husband is one such seasoned hunter, and every year he becomes more accomplished.

It used to be we were happy to find a few handfuls for a meal or two in the spring.

Now, the yields are measured in armfuls, and I joke that the cave-man is hunting and foraging for his family.

He owns it.

"I've been hunting and foraging again," he says while delivering a pile of fresh, green stalks to the kitchen table.

We often share our bounty, but not with the other hunters and foragers in the neighborhood. That would take the fun out of the unspoken competition.

Saturday night, a neighbor (also a hunter) spotted our Blazer parked on the road shoulder while we were scouring the ditch.

"Finding any?" His voice came across the two-way radio.

"Some," the husband said, piling an armload on the dash. "Were there any by the

"Only a couple," the husband replied over the radio airwaves. "I think that patch is about done producing.'

Liar!

We scored an armload at the church 10 minutes prior.

"It was a couple ... of armloads," the husband smiled slyly.

That's the other thing about asparagus hunting. Never reveal your secret patches and never encourage a stampede to a hot spot.

It was getting dark, and I suggested we head for home with our lucky catch.

"Are you kidding? We still have three more spots to check."

To my untrained eye, the green grass and asparagus were one and the same as the sun sank over the horizon.

But the hunter and forager was in his element. A healthy new growth sprouted overnight in his favorite (secret) locations and we piled another armload on our catch of the day.

I sighed.

I'll never tire of fresh asparagus, but we've been eating it at every meal steamed, broiled, grilled, blanched and raw. It's all good.

But this year, for the first time in my life, I experimented with preserving the produce.

If it's any good, we'll enjoy asparagus from a jar long after the patches go to seed.

And, if we can master that skill, maybe we can also grow our own asparagus patch in the back yard.

I planted a couple dozen ferny young plants this spring, and if there's success, hunting and foraging season will simply be harvest season when the patch matures.

Meanwhile, the hunt (and the sport) carries on.

# May is National Foster Care Month; will you accept the call?

Rock County foster parent Shawna Sjaarda recently wrote about being a foster parent and about the need for others to fill the role of foster parenting.

Foster care is defined as "a situation in which for a period of time a child lives with and is cared for by people who are not the child's parents." Sjaarda said this definition barely scratches the surface of what foster care actually means for all involved.

"To a child being placed in a foster home, it means anxiety, distrust, fear, grief, anger, and for some, hope," she writes. "They have just been taken out of their 'normal' and no matter what bad choices their parents have made, they remain fiercely loyal to their parents."

She said foster children can present challenges to biological children of foster parents. "It means anxiety, distrust, joy, anger, jealousy, frustration and love,' Sjaarda said. "A stranger has just moved into their house. He/she plays with their toys, takes away their parents' attention, and might even sleep in their room."

To foster parents, Sjaarda said, it means love, anxiety, grief, frustration, mourning, patience, perseverance and joy.

"Will this child harm our bio children? Will he/she sleep at night? Will he/she allow himself/ herself to be loved?" she writes.

"What a tangled web of emotions a child can spin when he/she is placed in a foster home. What an incredible opportunity to provide a stable home for a child in desperate need."

Children are removed from a home for a variety of reasons including neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, parental drug use, unsanitary living conditions, incarcerated parents and other reasons.

Sometimes children stay in a foster home because they need a place in an emergency until a family member is able to care for them. Other times, a child may stay while a parent receives treatment for an addiction. Still other times, a child may never return to their biological parents.

For Sjaarda and her husband, foster parenting is a calling. "God commands us to care for the orphan and the widow in their time of need (James 1:27), and we felt that we could do that, with God's help," she said.

Over the years they have had over 25 foster children in their home. "Some have stayed for a couple of hours, some for a few days, while others have stayed for 18 months. We have had a 2-day-old-baby placed with us, a 17-year old and nearly every age in

She said each situation is

unique in its challenges and joys.

"Being a foster parent isn't easy, convenient or even fun at times, but when a child returns a hug, remembers to speak with respect, confides in us or progresses in positive behavior, we are reminded why we do this, Sjaarda writes.

"Each child that enters our home is made in the image of God and we can show him or her God's love for a short period of time. We don't know the eternal impact of what we are doing, but we can faithfully plant seeds and shower each child with love while they are part of our family. We may never see the fruit of our labor, but if we can provide a safe, loving home for a child in need, that is reward enough for us."

Six counties in southwest Minnesota work together under Southwest Health and Human Services, and there are currently 47 licensed foster homes in these respective counties (four in Rock

#### Permit necessary when moving oversized items on Minnesota roadways

Question: Do I need an oversize or wide-load permit to haul a boatlift that is over 9 feet wide to my cabin?

Answer: You would need to obtain a permit because the width is over 8 feet 6 inches. Hauling oversized items without a permit or escorts (if required) can be dangerous and is illegal. Troopers and private escort companies are required to be trained and certified. An oversize and/or overweight permit is required when:

an overall loaded width exceeds 8 feet 6 inches.



# Students return with production of 'Grease' after 18-month pandemic hiatus

After an 18-month hiatus, Luverne High School drama students will perform "Grease" to a live audience starting June 3.

Director Shawn Kinsinger chose this spring's production from student feedback.

"Last summer, the students asked me if the next musical could be 'Grease," he said. "They really enjoyed producing 'Footloose' in the fall of 2019 and wanted a similar experience."

However, the coronavirus pandemic canceled all in-person performances since that 2019 production. As of Friday, all capacity restrictions related to the pandemic are lifted.

"We'll be able to put 'Grease' on in front of a full house," Kinsinger said.

Students began practicing in March for the six performances scheduled for 7:30 p.m. on June 3-5 and 10-12. There is no Sunday matinee.

The extra practice time was built into the schedule due to all school activities shut down last fall, and winter activities were pushed forward into the early spring months, Kinsinger said.

The calendar cleared in June for the later-than-usual musical performances.

"June provides a few advantages," he said. "It is after most of the other school activities have wrapped up, but most importantly it allowed us more time."

He said the time has allowed for vaccine distribution and, in case of a COVID-19 outbreak, the production could shut down for a couple of weeks without losing the overall number of rehearsals.

The musical coincides with

Luverne's Buffalo Days set for June 4-6. Luverne Area Chamber assisted in covering some of the costs for costumes.

Kinsinger said the local production captures elements from the 1972 broadway play and the 1978 movie.

"Recreating the iconic moments from 'Grease' is a lot of fun," Kinsinger said. "In some instances, we put our own spin on it, in others we try to stay as faithful to the movie as possible.

"There are so many moving pieces to this show. When it all comes together and I see the students making it happen — how excited they get — it's contagious."

The production received a special license to include four of the movie's most recognizable songs, "Hopelessly Devoted to You," "Sandy," "You're the One that I Want," and "Grease."

"It's worth it because the audience expects to hear those songs," Kinsinger said.

The musical, set in 1959, begins with summer romance between two incoming high school seniors: A greaser named Danny (portrayed by LHS senior Xavier Carbonneau) and a good girl named Sandy (senior Josie Golla).

After believing their summer love is at its end, they both end up at Rydell High School where they navigate highs and lows of school while trying to recapture that summer romantic magic.

The LHS production brings in "The Burger Palace Boys" or Danny's group of friends. In the movie they are called "T-Birds." The local production won't include the cinematic drag race.

"The show is so good that the audience won't miss it," Kinsinger said.

#### Prune pine varieties, prevent bunny and insect attacks

If you a p p l i e d systemic rose care as I advised earlier, that was six weeks ago so now



is the time to make a second application.

All forms of pine trees and shrubs are making their new growth now. That new growth is called a candle. For the more compact varieties of pines like Mugho and Tannenbaum, cutting off 1/2 to 3/4 of that new growth will result in a much fuller and compact plant. Completing this pruning chore every year will make a huge difference in how long that plant remains viable and the proper size in your landscape.

A challenge I seem to have every year in my gardening experience is dealing with rabbits nibbling, to one degree or another, on newly

emerging seedlings or plants that I have planted.

Earlier this spring I mentioned using Milorganite fertilizer as a repellent, and that worked until the rain dissolved it.

I don't want to make a second application of fertilizer so step two is a dusting of garlicpowder...justadusting, not a dousing. Garlic powder changes the flavor if they get past the smell, and usually they will leave the plant alone until it is big enough to hold its own. Again, rain washes off the remedy, but it is inexpensive and easy to reapply.

Excessive heat made for a short bloom season for our fern leaf peony flowers this year. Not something we can control, but we deal with what the weather is. Snip off the expired flower heads and remember that if you want to move or divide these peonies, the time to do that is when the foliage begins to yellow

in mid August. We prune lilacs when they have finished flowering and for the French hybrids, that time is now. Remember to cut them back far enough to give them room to grow, not to the size you want them to be.

In your vegetable garden, be vigilant watching for insect damage. It seems early for that problem, but I already see damage on tiny

kohlrabi seedlings, and often bean seedlings are a magnet for leaf hoppers.

Leaf hoppers are a small insect that works from the bottom of the leaf. They pierce the leaf tissue, feeding on the sap or juice of the leaf. The damage shows as white speckling on the leaf surface.

I don't know how the summer weather will unfold, but to help my garden survive if we have a dry summer, I mulch my crops with grass clippings. The mulch helps retain moisture, prevents weeds, keeps my shoes clean if the ground is wet, and adds organic matter to build soil health.

I do not use grass that has had herbicide applica $tions\,because\,that\,weed\,spray$ has the potential of damaging sensitive vegetable and flower crops.

Care of county polio patients amounted to \$21,936.59, of which \$19,798.14 was used for hospitalization, \$1,948.50 for doctors' fees, \$130.00 for nursing and physiotherapists, and \$59.95 for braces, special shoes, etc.

To defray these expenses, the local chapter drew on its \$12,205.21 fund collected during the 1949 March of Dimes campaign in the county, and \$13,400.00 advanced by the National Headquarters.



# Hills-Beaver Creek fifth-graders learn business through 'Shark Tank' experience

A twist to this year's fifth-grade lesson on creating businesses meant each of Dylan Gehrke's 23 students went through a "Shark Tank-like" experience.

"We want our students to know what it is like to create a product or service and have customers to sell it to," Gehrke said.

"We also want them to understand the logistics and all the numbers behind creating a business and how that works."

Based on the reality show of the same name, students or student groups presented business ideas to an "investor," to consider supporting.

"I thought the idea of the 'Shark Tank' would be fun for students to have an investment from a shark and work together to create the best-selling business in the fifth grade," Gehrke said. The "investors" panel included principal Todd Holthaus, paraprofessional Lexi Moore, teacher Shelly Fischer, Tyler Bush with Security Savings Bank and Gehrke himself.

"Students had to answer tough questions from the Sharks about how much money they have already spent so far, how much they will spend making their product, and what their profit goal was," Gehrke said.

"They were also asked about the quantity of their product they will have available on the day of the Entrepreneur Fair."

Monday's Entrepreneur Fair in the Hills-Beaver Creek Elementary gymnasium was the testing ground for the young entrepreneurs.

During their recess periods, students and staff from kindergarten through fourth grade spent no more than \$5 among the 12 businesses.

Together the businesses garnered \$622.50, which

earned investors \$74.95.

Gehrke invested in the best-selling business: REKkers of Stress because he liked their idea. He invested \$10 for 12.5 percent of the business' profits. Gehrke's investment was the highest of three bids for the business.

The business, named after the three founders — Ruby Susie, Ella Rheault and Khloe Susie, sold palm-sized stress balls made from balloons filled with Playdoh and glue.

"It's called a fidget toy and fidget toys are very popular today," Rheault said.

The trio estimated they put in six to seven hours making the 120 stress balls they brought to Entrepreneur Day to sell. They also baked two dozen cookies, also available for sale, which expanded their customer base.

"If they don't like stress balls, they could buy a cookie," Khloe Susie said.

REKkers of Stress sold \$121.25 of product, paid their investor \$15.15 and pocketed \$35.36 per person. "We thought we wouldn't get anyone to invest with us," Ruby Susie said.

An added lesson for the

entrepreneurs is that they paid taxes on their goods and services, which Gehrke estimated would comprise about half their profits.

#### Reconnect with the outdoor world by observing area reptiles and amphibians

I recently spent a few days in western South Dakota shooting prairie dogs. This was a great trip and the subject of another column in the next few weeks. I was wondering what other kinds of creatures made a life on the grazed grasslands of this part of the state.

As I was researching what those creatures might be, I came across a question that I just could not answer. "What is the difference between an amphibian and a reptile?"

I like to think I know quite a bit about the outdoors and the creatures that live in it, but this question humbled me greatly. So I researched it and would love to share with you what I learned.

Amphibians are frogs, toads, newts and salamanders. They have complex life cycles that require they spend their time between water and land. Their skin needs to be

kept moist in order to breathe and survive. They tend to have tender, smooth skin. Amphibians can breathe both under water and out of water.

Reptiles include crocodiles, alligators, turtles, lizards and snakes. These creatures breathe only through their lungs and thus have scales to keep them from drying out. They can spend long periods under water but do need to come up for air.

This created confusion for me. Turtles are considered reptiles who only breathe through their lungs, but turtles also spend the winters in Minnesota living under the ice. This does not seem to compute for me. As much as I looked, I could not find the answer to this conflicting evidence.

Both of these categories are called herpetofauna or "herps" for short. All herps are cold-blooded. This means they cannot regulate their own body temperatures by themselves. They utilize the environments in which they live to regulate body temperatures.

This is when a turtle sits on a log to absorb the energy of the sun. This warms them up. A cold dip in the lake can cool them off. These creatures on land may move in and out of vegetation to heat or cool their bodies. As a result, generally these animals will be substantially more active in the middle of the temperature span and less active when it is really hot or really cold.

Short of alligators and crocodiles, reptiles and amphibians are the stuff kids' dreams are made of. How many kids have you ever known that would not try to catch a frog or carry around a turtle if they could find one? I have seen 10 kids spend all day catching crawdads and other lake creatures, placing them in a bucket and then just staring down into it for the rest of the day.

The species and population numbers of reptiles and amphibians in particular are great indicators of the health of the environment they live in. Because amphibians have soft, tender skin, it easily absorbs toxins and pollution. These are called indicator

species. Lakes, rivers, wetlands and streams devoid of these creature types signal very poor water quality and when in high numbers, they indicate dramatically better water quality.

water quality.

One of the new threats to these venerable species is something called neonicotinoids. These are chemical seed coatings that protect row crop agriculture from many different pests. These chemicals have been shown to be beneficial to crop yields but are also shown to be very hard on pollinators and other desirables species.

Some research has shown that as these chemicals are leached off and travel into surface water sources, they can have a detrimental effect on everything from water insects to larger amphibians. As more research is done the effects of these seed coatings will become clearer.

Most people give very

little thought to reptiles and amphibians as they can't see them running round like you can a deer or a turkey. This does not make them un-important. As a conservationist and public lands advocate, I care about all of the creatures, big and small.

Take some time out of your busy schedule and take a walk in the tall grass or ankle-deep water and reconnect to the outdoor world. Look to see how the reptiles and amphibians in your neck of the woods are doing, then play your part in their protection. If you and I don't do it, then who will?
