Papik Motors acquires **Rock Rapids** dealership

Vander Lee Motors owners happy to sell to a family auto business

Papik Motors in Luverne is buying Vander Lee Motors in Rock Rapids, Iowa, the two family businesses announced this week.

Work will begin soon to remodel $the Rock Rapids \, dealers hip, and it will \,$ open in January under the new Papik Motors name.

"It's a great opportunity to expand and grow," Gary Papik said about the agreement with Norman and Rollie Vander Lee in Rock Rapids. Papik will employ 10 to 15 em-

ployees (up from the current six) and it will expand its inventory and service options.

"We will be increasing the inventory we carry down there and we'll definitely show we're there to do business in the long term," Gary said. "We hope to set that tone right away."

He also said Papik Motors looks forward to being a good local partner in Rock Rapids.

"I really want to emphasize the fact that we're a family business buyinganother family business; we're not some big corporation coming into their town," Gary said. "It's a friendly transition."

The Papiks and Vander Lees said the sale was good for both parties.

"It will be good to have some new, fresh blood and new ideas," Rollie said. "I hope the town supports them as much as they have supported us."

Papik's son, Jordan Papik, and son-in-law Micky Sehr will spearhead the Rock Rapids operation.

"Part of the reason this worked so well is because of our shared values," Gary's daughter Heidi Sehr said. "It's a nice marriage of the two types of

For both businesses, the timing was right.

The Vander Lee family was anticipating retirements, while the Papik family was contemplating growth.

"My dad's been working here for 60 years, and I've been here 47," Rollie said, adding that he's been selling cars for 36 years.

"Dad will be 85 in March and I'm 59; he doesn't need to work anymore, and I'm ready for something new."

Gary said he's thinking about the next generation of potential Papik Motors owners.

"I have 10 grandchildren," he said. "They may not all be interested in the business, but I want to make sure the opportunities are here for them."

The Papik-Vander Lee discussions started Nov. 21, 2017, when

Beaver Creek elevator to close, open at harvest time

New Vision decision also affects Adrian and Reading locations

New Vision Co-op elevators in Beaver Creek, Adrian and Reading will close as full-time operations as of late December and will operate as seasonal facilities after that.

According to New Vision CEO Frank McDowell, the decision was purely market driven, in an era of tight labor markets and increasing costs of labor and operations.

"It's part of what we have to do to keep moving forward," he said Monday, speaking from the Brewster headquarters office.

"We're not perfect, and we're sensitive to the community impact of these types of decisions."

McDowell spoke at length about the tight labor market and the difficulty of hiring and retaining employees.

"We've had 10 to 15 positions open all year, as have most area employers with a large workforce," he said. "We've asked our employees to do more, and most have been willing to do so."

New Vision Co-op employs 160 people at its 19 locations. McDowell declined to share wage information but said all full-time workers are paid based on experience and include benefits valued at roughly \$6 per hour.

Further, he said New Vision has a history of longevity among its employees with more than half of them with 10 years or more with the company and many of them with 30 to 40 years on the job.

Bert Verhey had managed operations in Beaver Creek for decades, and many farmers said his friendly customer service was the reason they brought their grain to Beaver Creek.

McDowell said New Vision offered Verhey a position driving feed truck in the off-season, but he declined the offer and submitted his resignation.

Gary stopped in at the Rock Rapids business with a casual suggestion.

"I said, 'Hey, if you have any interest in doing something with your dealership, we'd be interested in working with you," Gary said.

"About four or five me later, they called to say they're interested in selling and were wondering if we'd be interested in talking about it."

Exactly one year later, the business received GM approval to proceed with the transaction.

"Things work out for a reason sometimes," Gary said. The Vander Lees shared the same sentiments.

Norman had told his family he'd rather lock the doors than sell to a company that wouldn't be right for the community or the Vander Lee Motors legacy.

"But when Gary inquired, Dadwas interested in working

with him," Rollie said. Gary said the Vander Lees won't be disappointed.

"We'll operate the very same at both locations with the same level of service and processes," he said.

Papik Motors Luverne personnel will help supervise the Rock Rapids transition, but they'll be looking to hire new staff.

"It will all be new and different for everyone at first," Gary said.

The current Vander Lee motors office manager, Rhonda Hammer, will remain on staff, as will two service employees, Alana Broesder and MattClauson. Norman, Rollie and Rollie's son, Tom Vander Lee, are leaving the business.

Cosmetic updates to the Rock Rapids facility will be completed in the short term, but a GM-standard upgrade is planned in the next year or two.

Rollie paused when asked if he had any advice for the newcomers to Rock Rapids.

"You treat people fairly and ..." but then he switched gears mid-sentence. "These guys have been doing this long enough I don't have to give them advice. ... I wish them nothing but the best."

About Vander Lee Motors

The business has been a dealership since 1938 when it started as Kooiker Chevrolet.

Norman started working there as a bookkeeper in 1959 after getting his accounting degree at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion.

He made \$300 per month and eventually bought the business from Art Kooiker.

Rollie started with the company as a young boy, and Norman told his son his choices after high school were to go to college or work for someone else.

Rollie earned his business and accounting degree from Northwestern College in Orange City, Iowa, and returned to the family business after

graduating in 1982, eventually buying into the company over time.

About Papik Motors

Papik Motors dates back to 1914 when Jake Schoon started a garage in Steen and in 1928 opened Schoon Motors in Luverne.

In 1950 his son Warren became a partner, and in 1977 Gary Papik joined the Schoon Motors team. Warren later bought the business and Gary became vice president and general manager.

On May 26, 1989, Schoon and previous partner Arnie Tofteland were killed in a plane crash. Gary continued running the dealership and in 1990 bought the dealership along with Steve Schoon and Carolyn Tofteland.

In the fall of 1994, Gary became full owner and on Jan. 1, 1995, the business became Papik Motors. Later that year it moved to its new location on I-90.

do things and what we can do for our patients."

To treat a cavity, for example, the laser can pinpoint the area of decay and prepare only that part of the tooth for the filling.

"It targets what it needs to target, and it doesn't damage other parts of the tooth," Vis said.

She said this is especially true for cavities in the side of a tooth next to a healthy tooth.

"You don't damage the teeth beside it," she said. "It's not so traumatic, and it allows for better restorations and better bonding."

Because the laser takes the pain and trauma out of dental work, Vis said the service is especially popular with children.

"You don't have that noise and the vibration that they're scared of with the drill," she said, adding that this is true for adults, too.

"People don't have that fear of coming to the dentist, so they might not put off going to the dentist," Vis said. "Plus, they can go back to work without waiting for the numbing to wear off."

She points out that laser dentistry doesn't involve radiation, something she gets asked about frequently.

"I tell my patients it's just like lasik for eyes; this is lasik for teeth," she said. "As much as you can get excited about dentistry, this is pretty exciting in the world of dentistry."

Plus, laser dental work takes less time, thanks to precision technology that eliminates extra steps required by a drill.

"I can see more people in a day, which is important here because I'm so busy," she said, explaining that her patients don't have to wait as long for care.

Luverne Family Dental al $ready averages \, nearly \, 40 \, patients$ per day during its 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. business hours on Monday through Thursday.

The laser allows more efficient procedures and therefore room in the schedule for more patient appointments, which also helps pay for the \$150,000 machine — an investment other dentists have balked at.

"I'm the only one here, and I can make that decision on my own," Vis said.

"Some older dentists might not want to make that investment, but I'm young and I plan to be here a long time, so it made sense for me to do it."

The Solea Dental Laser is made by Convergent Dental, a private company in Needham Massachusetts. Vis traveled to Scottsdale, Arizona, in October for training to use the technol-

The CO2 laser technology, based on research by the California School of Dentistry, uses computer-guided wavelengths to perform painless procedures for both teeth and gums, from simple cavities to complex surgeries.

Vis said she's already expanded her care for dozens of "soft-tissue" treatments, such as removing skin flaps from wisdom tooth extractions, treating mouth sores and fibromas or alleviating swollen or inflamed

Many of the soft-tissue treatments would have to be referred outside of her office prior to the laser option.

"The world of medical and dental are very closely related," Vis said. "We now have medicalgrade laser treatment with a focus on dental care."

She added that her most important consideration in bringing the laser technology to Luverne is that it will improve quality of care for her patients.

"It was an opportunity for me to bring this to Luverne and to my patients," Vis said. "It's a standard of care issue, and my patients love it." Vis, a Salem, South Dakota,

native, has been a dentist in

this," she said. "I love the small town dynamic, and I see it as an honor that so many patients come to me. ... People can go anywhere for dental care, but they choose

to come here." That small-town focus is another reason Vis said laser tech-

nology is good for her patients. "I don't like to drive to Sioux Falls, and most of them don't either — especially the elderly," she said. "If this means I don't have to refer them to Sioux Falls for care, it's better for everyone."

On a side note, Vis said she fields questions from the community about her role with Luverne Surgical Dental Clinic.

"They're friends of mine, and they offer another service here that we won't need to send patients out of town for," Vis said. They're specialists in our field; they offer oral implants and surgeries, I offer dental care."

"Bert's a great guy, and we're sorry to see him leave," McDowell said Monday.

McDowell said an important point is that three New Vision locations aren't closing; they're becoming seasonal operations that will be open full time during harvest and closed during the off-season months, unless employees are on site loading grain out.

"The Beaver Creek elevator handles 85 percent of its volume during the two months of harvest," McDowell said.

"We also handle a very small amount of bagged feed. There is very little commercial activity during the rest of the year.... It isn't an option to staff these elevator locations when labor is needed elsewhere in our business."

He said employees are encouraged to fill in where and when needed to help out.

"Teambuilding is impor-

tant and getting the job done for our feed customers is a higher priority than maintaining a wintertime coffee shop for folks that may not be New Vision members. It would be great if New Vision could keep them open for that, but it's not a good business decision."

He presented his recommendation to the New Vision Board of Directors at their Dec. 4 meeting.

"It was a management responsibility we asked them to support," McDowell said. "Our strategy isn't to close elevators; our strategy is to get work done."

As part of the seasonal arrangement, the Beaver Creek, Adrian and Reading elevators will no longer sell bagged feed for cattle, hogs and pets.

New Vision maintains a feed route truck that delivers direct to the farm Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

These products will be available in Magnolia and Ellsworth.

Similarly, New Vision's elevators at Hills and Magnolia will continue to accept grain, or farmers may utilize New Vision's on-farm pickup service where possible (with transport rates imbedded in terminal prices).

"This service is managed by the New Vision grain originators and is more popular every year," McDowell said.

The changes are effective at the end of December in Beaver Creek and Dec. 14 in Adrian and Reading.

So far, these locations are the only New Vision terminals to assume this seasonal schedule; however New Vision has temporarily closed several locations during spring planting season for many years.

The Beaver Creek elevator dates back to the early 1900s

when it was the Farmer's Elevator of Beaver Creek.

In May 1993 the Beaver Creek Cooperative Elevator merged with the Hills Cooperative Farm Service. The new company became the Hills-Beaver Creek Co-op Farm Service.

In 2003 it became part of the New Vision Co-op group of elevators.

Answer: According to Minnesota State Statute 169.72, "Every solid rubber tire on a vehicle must have rubber on its entire traction surface at least one inch thick above the edge of the flange of the entire periphery. No person shall operate or move on any highway any motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer, having any metal tire in contact with the roadway, except in case of emergency."

An exemption includes the occasional use of studded tires by nonresidents under the following conditions:

•A person operating a motor vehicle licensed and registered in anotherstateorprovinceofaforeign country that authorizes the use of metal studs or wire embedded tires on its highways may use such on our state highways while occasionally within the state. Use of a vehicle in

Minnesota for less than 30 days in any consecutive six-month period would be considered occasional.

•The metal studs shall not exceed 5/16 of an inch in diameter including the stud casing with an average protrusion beyond the tread surface of not more than 7/64 of an inch. The number of studs in a tire shall not exceed two percent of the total net contact area.

A person whose regular place of employment is within the state orwho is a student at an educational institution located within the state shall not operate a vehicle, regardless of its place of registration, upon any highway within the state if such vehicle is equipped with tires which would be unauthorized werethe vehicle registered in this state.

Question: Other night my coworker got pulled over and was given a warning about ride height. It $was \, not \, slammed \, to \, the \, ground \, but$ the trooper said that it was illegal. What is the Minnesota state law for ride height?

Answer: Minnesota law states that if a vehicle's suspension has been altered by more than 6 inches either higher or lower, it is illegal, unless the bumper is modified to within the 6 inches of the original manufactured bumper height.

All passenger vehicles must be equipped with front and rear bumpers that do not exceed a height of:

•20 inches on any passenger automobile or station wagon.

•25 inches on any four-wheel drive multipurpose type vehicle, van, or pickup truck, when the vehicle is being operated on a public highway.

The height of the bumper shall

be determined by measuring from the bottom of the bumper, excluding any vertical bumper attachments, to the ground.

Avehicle which has an original bumper and does not exceed a height of 30 inches, may be modified by attaching a full width bumper to the original bumper to meet the height requirement. The attached bumper must be at least 4.5 inches vertically, be centered on the vehicle's centerline, extend at least 10 inches on either side of the frame, and be attached to the frame in at least four places with angle braces at no less than 45 degrees so that it effectively transfers impact to an extent equal to or greater than the original bumper.

Springwater Township Board opens new township hall for public meetings

The Springwater Township Board gathered Tuesday night, Dec. 4, for their first official board meeting in their brand new township hall.

On the agenda that evening, the board discussed final transactions associated with paying for the new

They also signed a thank-you letter to the Prairie Rose Community Wind Fund Board for its role in paying for the new township hall.

For the past four years, the township has received wind production tax money (nearly \$13,000 per year)

for the nine turbines located in Springwater Township. In addition, the board applied for a grant through the Prairie Rose Minnesota Community Fund and received \$12,500 for that request.

In all, the entire cost of the \$41,000 project (including \$9,000 for demolition and cement pad) was covered by wind money. "We now have a township hall that is handicap-

accessible so all of our residents can attend our meetings if they so wish, and are able to vote in our township elections without any barriers," the letter stated. It was signed by Springwater Township chairman

supervisor Tom Baustian. Dennis Reese Construction was the primary contractor for the nearly 700-square-foot building, which

was completed at the end of November. The former building, which once served as a country schoolhouse, was demolished earlier this year

after the board agreed it would cost more to fix it than it would to start over.

In fact, for most of the past decade, the board had been meeting in the home of township clerk Teresa Kramer on the western edge of the township. The property occupies one-third of an

acre on the southwest corner of County Roads 6 and 8, and it had a deteriorating roof and settling foundation, in addition to hazardous wiring and no handicap accessibility. After some discussions about leasing space in Beaver Creek, the board decided in

the spring of 2015 to seek bids for a new, small, pole-type building on the same site. Landscaping work will be completed in the spring of 2019, and the board is considering an open house for the new facility during

New Vision beef, swine program provides 4-H'ers with pride of ownership

Rock County 4-H'ers can experience livestock ownership under an affordable lease agreement through New Vision Co-on

The Club Beef and Club Swine programs provide students with animals to own, raise, exhibit and sell under the supervision of 4-H and New Vision staff.

An introduction to the Rock County program is at 7 p.m. today (Dec. 13) in the Extension meeting room. The meeting is open for all youth in second grade through one year after high school graduation.

The program formats are similar to current offerings for 4-H families in Nobles and Jackson counties.

New Vision began the Club Beef program in Nobles County 11 years ago.

Lastyear 15 Nobles County 4-H'ers participated in the beef program.

The Club Swine program began last year with six 4-H'ers.

"A lot of kids are young; half under fifth grade," said Nobles County 4-H Program Coordinator Katie Klosterbuer. "It's a great introduction to livestock raising."

That introduction allows participants to move forward into the regular beef project with the potential to earn a trip to the Minnesota State Fair.

Many of the Nobles County 4-H'ers are now comfortable in pursuing a state trip, due to the knowledge gained from the club programs.

New Vision focuses on animal production with the hands-on learning experience.

"The biggest part of the project is learning that it costs money to buy a calf and it costs money to feed the calf," said Micah Rupp with New Vision.

Under an agreement signed by 4-H'ers, their parents and the cooperative, 4-H'ers pay initial fees of \$150 for a dairy beef calf and \$50 for a barrow or gilt.

In the agreement, the exhibitor assumes ownership of the animal at delivery, usually about three months before the county fair. The 4-H'ers are responsible for their animals' care and must show them at the county fair with other 4-H'ers in the program.

New Vision allows the 4-H'ers to charge feed expenses and the remaining value of the animal until after the animal is sold at fair. After the sale, the exhibitor receives any profits

after New Vision is paid in full.
Each 4-H'er is required to keep profit and expense records on each animal.

Darin Ponto with New Vision assisted with the Nobles County Dairy Beef Program beginning 11 years ago both through his daughter's participation in the program and through his job with New Vision.

"It has been fun to be involved," he said. "Care is the key."

However, adult guidance is also a must because many of the 4-H'ers and their families are newto livestock production.

"These kinds of programs provide phenomenal resources for learning opportunities," Klosterbuer said.

New Vision offers lessons on feed rations, vaccinations, ear notching and other industry practices. Four-H volunteers assist with the fair preparation and handling the animals at the fair.

After the fair, 4-H'ers can choose to purchase the animals themselves.

Application deadline for the Club Calf and Club Swine programs is Feb. 1. The initial fees are also due Feb. 1 to the Rock County Extension Office.

1953: County's first measurable snowfall totals four inches

The following appeared in the Rock County Star Herald on Dec. 3, 1953.

County Gets Four Inches Of Snow

Rock county received its first snowfall of any consequence this season last Saturday afternoon and evening. By the time it had subsided it had reached a depth of about four inches.

Fortunately, there was no wind with it, but it contained just enough moisture that it had packed solidly on the streets and highways as cars drove over it. Subsequent freezing left the paved highways in the county and city streets a sheet of ice.

Local garages kept their tow trucks busy Saturday night and Sunday. There were no serious accidents, but motorists found that it was easy to become stalled wherever there was a slight incline.

nt incline. Up to now, the only snow that had

fallen in the county was just a trace about two weeks ago.

Saturday's snowlay as it had fallen over the landscape Sunday, presenting a beautiful sight to those who appreciate snow as scenic beauty.

It was considerably different from last year's first snow, which was accompanied by howling winds up to 40 miles per hour, necessitating the closing of schools, and causing other difficulties. Lastyear's snow storm was on November 26.

Temperatures reached a low of 4 degrees here Monday morning, coldest of the season.

On Tuesday the mercury climbed up to a point where the ice on the highways melted sufficiently so that roads cleared.

Luverne's new mounted snow loader was given its initial workout early Sunday. City snowremoval crews were on the job at 1:30 a.m., using the blade to move the snow from curbs toward the center of the street. At 2:30

a.m. hauling was started, with the new loader filling each truck in a minute's time. By 5:30 a.m., all the snow on Main street from the Power plant to the Highway 75 intersection has been hauled away.

The push plow was used to clear the streets in town where there were inclines, because it was chiefly where there were hills that cars were having difficulty making progress.

The new snow loader can be used as a rotary plow as well. It cost the city \$1,685, and it was decided at Tuesday night's council meeting that it will be paid for in three equal monthly installments of \$500, and a final payment of \$185.

Event brings public awareness to the different types of poverty

"DeFEET Poverty: One Step at a Time" drove home an important message on Nov. 17 when unseasonably cold weather shortened the event in Luverne City Park.

Dan Wendland was one of nine participants who learned of the conditions some people face daily by walking barefoot.

"If you are poor, no matter the weather, you're poor," he said. You can't just be poor in nice warm weather."

Members of Future **Career Community** Leader Association (FC-CLA) and Luverne High School students Courtney Wendland, Mikayla Wiederhoeft and Adriana Gonzalez organized the event to bring awareness that poverty exists on the local level.

The trio are youth members of the #Luv1LuvAll, a community group working to end poverty in Rock County.

The local group's efforts prompted the students to select poverty awareness as their FC-**CLA topic for Students** Taking Action with Recognition (STAR).

In planning the event, the students didn't expect a light dusting of snow and high temperatures in the 20s on Saturday, Nov. 17, a date that typically sees temperatures in the low 40s.



"It helped me realize more of what people in poverty go through when it gets to the colder seasons," said

Wiederhoeft. "And how heartbreaking it is when people aren't able to get the necessities of life."

While money is only one of many "feet" poor people walk with, the students realized poverty takes on other forms such as being in poor health, educationally poor, poor spiritually and living in physically poor surroundings.

The experience left organizers counting their blessings.

'It made me realize what I had and how everything could be so much worse than it is," said Courtney Wendland, who graduates next spring.

"My parents do a lot for my siblings and me, and it can be easy to take things we get for granted and not appreciate the hard work they do to provide for us."

HOMESTEAD

Have you purchased or moved into a property in the past year?

Contact the Land Records Office to file a homestead application if you or a qualifying relative occupy the property as a homestead on or before December 1, 2018.

Who is a qualifying relative?

For agricultural property, a qualifying relative includes the child, grandchild, sibling, or parent of the owner or owner's spouse.

For residential property a qualifying relative also includes the owner's uncle, aunt, nephew, or niece.

When do I apply?

You must apply on or before December 15, 2018.

Once homestead is granted, annual applications are not necessary unless they are requested by the Rock County Land Records Director.

Contact the Land Records Office by December 15, 2018 if the use of the property you own or occupy as a qualifying relative has changed during the past year.

CHANGES IN YOUR HOMESTEAD STATUS

If you should sell, move, or for any reason no longer qualify for the homestead classification, you are required to notify the Land Records Office within 30 days of the change in homestead status.

AGRICULTURAL PROPERTY OWNERS

If you have agricultural land that you own and farm yourself or have a son, daughter, son-inlaw, daughter-in-law, brother, sister or other legal entity farm, you may be eligible for a special agricultural homestead.

A child of wonder

he (Zechariah) asked for a writing tablet and wrote, 'His name is John.' And they all



wondered. And immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue loosed, and he spoke, blessing God. And fear came on all their neighbors. And all these things were talked about through all the hill country of Judea, and all who heard them laid them up in their hearts, saying, 'What then will this child be?' For the hand of the Lord was with him." Luke 1:63-66

Every child is a miracle, a gift of God. But some are really special miracles with extraordinary purpose to their lives. For instance, Isaac was born to Abraham and Sarah when Abraham was 100 years old and she was 90. Moses was born in Egypt when all Hebrew male babies were to be drowned in the Nile River. ness and living off the land (as God provided for him). He also began preaching about the judgment of God against sinners. He spoke of God's righteous anger against all who sinned. He spoke with passion for the sinners that would repent and be baptized. He was telling people this so that they could be prepared to stand before God without fear of condemnation. He was good at what he did and it didn't take long for people from all around to come to him for baptism and forgiveness of their sins.

Many came and were saved because the Holy Spirit was with John and the message that he proclaimed. But there were others who came to confront John with questions of where he got his authority to do his work. They saw him as a threat to the organized church in Jerusalem and they didn't like him.

Blessed be the name of Jesus!

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

Paul Boyenga received two write-in votes in Rock County and Seth Spronk two write-in votes in Pipestone County. Paul and Seth will serve as the First Alternate in Rock and Pipestone, respectively. An alternate is only called upon to attend meetings when the County Committee member is unable to attend a meeting or complete their term. As always, these results are subject to Minnesota FSA State Committee approval.

Paul Doherty has produced corn, soybeans, cattle and hogs in Kanaranzi Township for 39 years. He is an

active member of the Rock County Corn and Soybean Growers and in the past has served as chairman for both the Rock County Rural Water Board and Rock County Planning and Zoning Board. Paul is married to Pat, who is also involved in the farming operation. They have two daughters and a granddaughter.

Allen Gilmore has produced corn, soybeans and hay all his life in Pipestone County. He also has a cow calf operation, as well as draft quarter horses. Allen is an active member of his church. He is married to Barb and they have two daughters and eight grandchildren.

The next meeting of the County Committee will be an organizational meeting on Jan. 15, 2019, in Rock County and Jan. 16, 2019, in

Pipestone County. At these meetings, members of the County Committee will select a minority adviser and vote to determine the positions of chairperson and vice chairperson for 2019.

In Rock County Paul Arends is the current chairperson, Chad Hoff the current vice chairperson, Mark Vander Pol the regular member and Charla Sandbulte the minority adviser.

In Pipestone Jared Nelson is the current chairperson, Allen Gilmore the current vice chairperson, Ken Christensen the regular member and Nancy Hinricher the minority adviser.
